

# **Carnegie Units**

- I Semester Class = .5 credit
- I Yearlong Class = I credit (.5 earned per semester)

# **Grading Scale**

A (90-100)



 7 additional points are added to a final grade of 70 or above in approved Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses Centennial IOI: Grading



In middle school, grades are calculated using <u>a</u> <u>system of averages</u>.

- <u>Example</u> 8<sup>th</sup> grade English Semester I: 60 (F) Semester 2: 80 (B) \*Yearly Ave: 70 (C)
- Student passes class for the year (earns 1 full credit)

In Fulton County, high school grades <u>are not</u> <u>averaged</u>... Each semester is independent.

 <u>Example</u> 9<sup>th</sup> grade English Semester I: 60 (F) Semester 2: 80 (B) \*No Yearly Average

 Student fails 1<sup>st</sup> semester; passes 2<sup>nd</sup> semester (earns 1/2 credit)

- Students will have a final exam that counts 20% of a student's final grade in the course (SI and S2)

### GPA Calculation



- To calculate FCS GPA:
  - By Semester
    - Add final course grades for semester
    - Divide by total courses taken
  - Cumulative GPA
    - Add final grades for each course
    - Divide by total courses taken
- Courses are not weighted by credit earned (a 1.0 credit course counts the same as a 0.5 credit course when calculating GPA)
- HOPE GPA
  - Determined annually by the GA Student Finance Commission

### High School credits earned in Middle School

- Students can have earned HS credits for math and/or world languages.
- 7th and 8<sup>th</sup> grade world language equals 1.0 HS credit.
- Student/Parent must provide an official transcript from the school awarding the course credit(s) if transferring from a non-Fulton County middle school.

### <u>Promotion</u>

- Freshmen: 0 4.5 credits
- Sophomores: 5.0 10.5 credits
- Juniors: 11.0 16.5 credits
- Seniors: 17.0 or more credits

### **Progress Reports and Report Cards**

- Progress Reports provide student's status at the 6 and 12 week marks
- Report Cards provide the student's final grades for the semester
- Home Access Center (HAC)

### Home Access Center



Parents and students can monitor grades, attendance, and discipline through Home Access Center (HAC).

Parents can pick up their user name and password for HAC in the front office with an ID.

Students can also register for Student Access Center.






